# Oh, Kay!

## A Record-Breaking Donor's Story

When we first met her, briefly, amidst the hubbub of Divine Mercy Care's 2018 Gala, we already knew that we were encountering one of the most remarkable donors our organization had ever seen. Sitting down to talk with Kay Crnkovich shortly before Thanksgiving, we learned much more about the scope of her giving.

Happily ensconced in her daughter Jean's sunny living room, surrounded by the bustlings—about of three generations of family members, 93-year-old Kay presided as the undisputed matriarch of the Crnkovich tribe. Although the Marquette graduate moved to Virginia only five years ago, her contribution to Tepeyac OB/GYN has resulted in the breaking of a record. More of her descendants have been delivered by Tepeyac than have those of anyone else in the practice's nearly 25-year history.

Members of the large and abundantly faith-filled Catholic family to which Kay gave birth have, in their turn, given their trust and their healthcare allegiance to Tepeyac OB/GYN and their monetary donations to Divine Mercy Care. With the help of daughter Jean and after a great deal of naming, remembering, and calculating, Kay came up with a total for us of just how many Crnkovich progeny we're talking about. The result? An astonishing *thirty-three* of her grandchildren and great-grandchildren were delivered by Tepeyac doctors!

Kay's daughter Jean was, in fact, the first to know Dr. Bruchalski, having met him in the early eighties while he was still in medical

school. Jean's brother Bob Crnkovich, a lawyer, was instrumental in establishing Tepeyac OB/GYN as a legal entity. Joe Crnkovich was the first of Kay's sons to move to the Northern Virginia area with his job at Naval Systems; Bill followed, destined for an assignment with IBM. Bob arrived in 1986; Ed came later to attend George Mason University. These and other facts of Crnkovich family members' arrivals in the area, marriages, children and grandchildren peppered the conversation as Kay's school-age descendants helped their mothers nearby. As we spoke, we recognized the sturdy piece of whole family cloth that had been woven from these many threads of connection—and we understood better the great depth and variety of Crnkovich contributions to Divine Mercy Care.

A few of Kay's grandchildren were introduced to us. They were aware, it seemed, of the strong ties between their family, Tepeyac OB/GYN, and Divine Mercy Care. To us, meeting them, it seemed likely that they will continue that tradition. If matriarch Kay, who clearly still commands so prominent a place in their affection and respect, has anything to do with it—they will.

# Meeting Tepeyac's Needs

As a ministry as well as a business, Tepeyac must combine grants from Divine Mercy Care with its own good business practices in order to balance its annual budget. Here are just a few reasons why Tepeyac needs Divine Mercy Care's support:

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**Tepeyac takes most insurances, even though insurance neither reimburses the full amount billed nor (often) pays in a timely fashion.**

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**Providers spend time on education and Divine Mercy Care programs, including spending extra time with medical students rotating to learn about pro-life medicine.**

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**Most other OB/GYNs depend on the revenue from contraception, abortion, and sterilization. Tepeyac does not offer these services, opting instead for scientifically proven methods of Natural Family Planning, prenatal care discounts for women in need, and surgical procedures only when medically necessary.**

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**About 1 in 3 women that deliver with Tepeyac is in need. This clientele brings with it additional costs:**

- Extra personnel to deal with language translation, financial aid applications, and connection to local resources.
  - Extra doctor time spent on patient care.
- Free first sonograms and initial prenatal appointments for each abortion-minded woman.
- Lost revenue as a result of providing aid through Medicaid, MERCY sliding fee scales, and partnerships with pregnancy centers—none of which offers complete reimbursement for care.

# Where There's a Heartbeat: Karol's Story

Tepeyac doctors offered hope; you provided financial support. Your donations made this threatened mother and son's care possible. Since his mother doesn't want Sebastian's photo made public, we offer instead lovely images of his name saints.

The year was 2015. Karol was eighteen, pregnant, unmarried, frightened, and without support from those older kinfolk who might have lent her encouragement and assistance. One relative in particular pressured her relentlessly to have an abortion and, eventually, Karol did. No sooner was the procedure completed than she felt deepgoing grief and remorse. Under no circumstances, she vowed, would she ever again do anything remotely comparable.

In late October 2017, Karol reported to the local pregnancy center A Woman's Choice with certain symptoms--and was found to be pregnant again. This time, her personal situation was almost entirely different than before. The baby's father was entirely supportive of her and of the idea that a child might result from their time together. Still, she needed financial assistance for her prenatal care. With a counselor from A Woman's Choice, Karol went to her first-ever Tepeyac appointment. Two weeks later, her heart skipping a beat, she saw the ultrasound image of her baby. Despite early bouts of nausea so severe at times that they felt like



hemorrhaging, by twelve or thirteen weeks' gestation Karol began to feel "as though it all seemed to be coming together."

Suddenly, at fourteen weeks, her water broke and cramps began. The Tepeyac on-call doctor sent her to the ER. An ultrasound revealed only a little amniotic fluid left around her baby. Warning that she would probably miscarry, the ER doctor sent her home to wait for nature to take its course.

Karol scheduled an early next-day appointment with Tepeyac's Dr. Fisk, who promptly started her on a course of antibiotics. He was frank about the low survival rate for babies in this kind of situation, but "Your child has a strong heartbeat," he reassured her. "While there's



a heartbeat, there's hope." Dr. Fisk placed her on a strict schedule of semi-weekly appointments. At each, the baby's situation was closely monitored via ultrasound.

Eager for more reassurance, Karol sought out a specialist. The woman she found gave her only a worst-case scenario (a 1% possible survival rate) and offered termination as the only option. After her first visit, Karol didn't return to that doctor.

Tepeyac referred Karol to Dr. McLaren, a high-risk obstetrician who works closely with Tepeyac patients as necessary. Despite multiple scares involving ER visits, she maintained her pregnancy until 23 weeks. At that point, the doctors confined her to modified bedrest at Fairfax Hospital. At 27

weeks she went into labor and gave birth to a son.

"Sebastian Gabriel," she replied without hesitation when hospital personnel asked for his name. It was the patron saint of soldiers, along with God's angelic messenger, whose names had been chosen for Karol's brave little battler for life. Minutes after his birth, Sebastian was whisked away from his mother and installed as an extreme micropremie in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit.

In the months between his delivery date and his July 2018 due date, Karol visited Sebastian daily in the NICU, all the while maintaining attendance at a demanding schedule of college classes. He progressed beautifully, responding to her presence and attention. After arriving home on 15 July free of the need for continued oxygen apparatus or artificial feeding, he grew quickly, soon reaching a quite-decent weight of 8 lbs. 6 ounces.

Karol is quick to point out that her strength for maintaining her pregnancy might have failed without the Tepeyac doctors—the only professional caregivers she saw who were willing to give her hope. To women facing situations like hers, she has this to say: "Don't be afraid, or let anyone bully you into terminating your pregnancy, because of risk factors. Give your baby a chance! Sebastian has been stronger than I. 'Where there's a heartbeat, there's hope,' Dr. Fisk told me—and he was right!"

### An Ongoing Donation of Self

By the time Valerie Andreotta's husband retired from his second career, he was ready to slow the pace of his professional activities and spend more time with her. Having married immediately after earning her undergraduate degree in Early Childhood Education, Valerie had spent her entire adult life as a full-time wife and mother. She had borne and raised six children, undergone a multitude of household moves, lived in Australia and in seven U.S. states, and visited every one of the fifty states. One might think that, after such an active lifestyle, she too would be content now simply to relax, claim more of her husband's time, and enjoy playing with the twelve grandchildren who call her "Voomie."

But if one thought that, one would be wrong.

Free from the need to be the only one managing the home during standard working hours, Valerie was seeking a chance to spend some of that free time volunteering. Organizations like Goodwill, Red Cross, and Salvation Army were on her radar. When her husband noticed that Divine Mercy Care was advertising for volunteer help in the Andreottas' church bulletin, he called it to her attention. ## Pro-life 2018 Year in Review

The pro-life cause saw much political activity during 2018. As we know, the pro-abortion Democratic Party took over the **House of Representatives**. As a result, there will be no new pro-life legislation coming out of the House. On the brighter side, however, President Trump said he would veto any bill that promoted abortion. Also, despite the House setback, in the Senate the pro-life forces picked up several key seats held previously by those with radical pro-abortion records.

In the **Senate**, North Dakota's Kevin Cramer defeated incumbent Heidi Heitkamp. Josh Hawley defeated Missouri's pro-abortion Claire McCaskill. In Florida, Rick Scott defeated longtime pro-choice incumbent Bill Nelson. Lastly, in Indiana, Mike Braun

defeated incumbent Senator Joe Donnelly. Tennessee picked up Martha Blackburn, a strong supporter who had represented her state in the House. These pro-life gains will help get Trump federal court appointees confirmed. This is especially significant given the contentious confirmation process (read: character assassination) that preceded Justice Brett Kavanaugh's confirmation as the newest appointee to the Supreme Court. The Republican majority's Senate gains will allow for a little more breathing room for Trump and Senate Republicans.

At the **state level**, pro-life picked up key governorships in Ohio, Florida, and Iowa. Most notable was the victory of Iowa Governor Kim Reynolds, who signed some of the most aggressive pro-life state legislation in the

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country--including the heartbeat bill. He defeated Fred Hubbell, a former longtime board member of the nation's largest abortion chain, Planned Parenthood.

In Alabama, the passage of Referendum Amendment 2 affirmed that the unborn has a right to life and that the state constitution allows neither the right to, nor taxpayer funding of, abortion. In West Virginia, Amendment 1 stopped taxpayer money from going to abortions. Previously, the state funded abortions up to five months under Medicaid. Even California's radical pro-abortion Governor Jerry Brown rejected legislation requiring state universities and colleges to provide abortion-inducing drugs to their students. California courts also rejected a proposal that would have required pro-life pregnancy centers to provide information about abortion. In a 5 to 4 decision, Justice Clarence Thomas wrote

the majority opinion stating that the new law likely violates the First Amendment as compelled speech.

There is much work to do, to be sure, but these victories hearten those fighting to protect the rights of the unborn.

We must remind ourselves that we are not fighting against mere human beings, but principalities and powers. Our true enemies are not our fellow humans, but rather the Evil One, who seeks to destroy every human soul in this life and the next.

People of all faiths must continue to pray and offer sacrifice for our goal of ending abortion, which not only destroys the life of the unborn, but also adversely impacts the life and well-being of the mother. May our prayers spur us on to remain vigilant in love and truth, speaking out courageously against the evil of abortion.
